Planning Board Hears Stein Proposal

Next public hearing set for March 26th

This is a continuation of TAVI's efforts to share information about pending applications to construct warehouses in and around the Allentown-Upper Freehold community. The current spate of pending warehouse proposals, if approved, will impact our entire community. TAVI encourages you to be informed, aware and engaged.

After three hours of questioning from over 200 residents on a rainy February night, the Upper Freehold Planning Board ended its first hearing on an application to build over 450,000 square feet of warehouses on 23 acres fronting on North Main Street/County Route 539 (next to the Valero gas station) and commonly known as the Stein Property. **The Board set the next public hearing date for March 26, 2024 at 7 pm.** Members of the public, as well as Stuart Lieberman, Esq., representing the Borough of Allentown, will be able to continue questioning the developer about its site plan and variance requests.

There was time for just one witness during the first hearing, who provided some details but often deferred to future witnesses, who are expected to include an architect and traffic specialist, among others. Drawing shows warehouses with roundabout on CR 539 at the 526 Bypass.

Residents seemed surprised – and dismayed – to learn that the entrance to the proposed warehouse will center on a traffic circle built at the west end of the Route 526 bypass, just south of the Valero gas station on North Main Street. The developer also admitted that it does not expect to be a long-term owner of the warehouses once they are built, raising concerns about maintenance and management of the facility. There are no known tenants for the warehouses at this time. Probasco Drive residents were told that the buffer between their yards and the warehouses would range between 95 and 113 feet and consist of two rows of evergreen trees.

The Planning Board said the Stein Property has been zoned for warehouses since 1992, notwithstanding Upper Freehold's "Country Code" adopted in 1998, which commits the Township to policies that "provide its constituents with a Country Lifestyle." Also in issue is the State's Land Use Law, which says local zoning must "promote the safety, morals and general welfare" with development that "does not conflict with the development and general welfare of neighboring municipalities."

Wittenborn Farm – History vs. Development....

Editor's Note: You've probably driven by this impressive home on your way into or out of Allentown. Since 1808 it has stood just beyond the Borough's Church Street border with Robbinsville. The house and its 20 acres, zoned *"village* transitional" (which would permit commercial development) is listed as "pending" with an asking price of \$4.5 million. Efforts have been ongoing to preserve the property as part of a "greenbelt" which would protect Allentown from increased traffic and environmental impacts,

particularly to Indian Run Creek, just to the south. With thanks to local historian, John Fabiano, following is why the property is historically significant:

John Imlay, owner of "Wittenborn" in 1779

In 2006 the Imlay-Buzby Farm, located at 824 Allentown-Robbinsville Rd., was determined eligible to be entered into the New Jersey and

National Registers of Historic Places based on the National Park Service's Criterion B standard. The house and farmstead. commonly called Wittenborn's, was purchased by the wealthy Philadelphia merchant, John Imlay (1749-1813) in 1779, most likley in response to the following ad: " For Sale, a valuable plantation situated near Allen Town... containing 240 acres, on which a kitchen, barn, good house, waggon-house, a good orchard, about 100 acres of cleared land, the rest good timber land by Joseph Brown, jun." John Imlay

was born locally at New Sharon, where his father Johnston, who had married Robert Montgomery's daughter Isabella, was a wheelwright. It is supposed he lived here during the construction of his elaborate 1790 mansion on South Main St. in Allentown. The current house replaced an earlier structure and is believed to be built at turn-of-the- 19th century, with former owner George Busby stating "it was built by Joseph Imlay in 1808," while a 1988 historic site survey estimated c.1796.

According to that survey, "this 5bay, 2 ¹/₂ center hall plan house, now stuccoed, is unusually large and wide for this area. It has a 4bay side elevation and four interior end chimneys. The door has a handsome Federal-style molded trim, the vertical members have a double cornicelike detailing surmounted by an entablature, below which is a round arch with a semi-circular fanlight... Windows are large, in keeping with house's scale, the southernmost windows have 12/12 sash; the two northern

bays have 6/6 windows...The

front parlor has an usual Federal style mantel, which may not be original. The wall between the hall and northern parlor is unusally thick and the attic apparently indicates this was the original end of the house." This house is comparable in style and scale with Allentown's Imlay House, without the elaborate woodwork displayed in the latter's front parlors.



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A COLONIAL CONUNDRUM – What to do about the bodies under our street?

It's a somewhat unusual problem to be sure, but one facing Allentown nonetheless: How to restore the Olde Burying Ground on Lakeview Drive so that folks aren't driving over the graves of our forebears. The boundaries of the cemetery have been clearly marked on town documents and deeds since 1706, but in the real world, the lines blurred and an alley as well as Lakeview Drive slowly encroached upon the area known to be part of the cemetery. Sure enough, radar has now clearly revealed three graves under an unpaved alley and another 14 burials under Lakeview Drive.

graves, one might think the natural reaction would be to respectfully seek other routes to and from



the rears of Main Street businesses (there's another alley 100 feet to the east of the offending egress and outside the cemetery boundary) and start working to put Lakeview Drive back to where it was intended to be. Alas, life – and apparently death – cannot be that simple, and old habits die hard (pun intended). TAVI is attempting to work with the Borough and adjacent landowners to persuade them to use the available alternate routes and reconfigure Lakeview Drive.
